hosts the Cluster of Excellence “Beyond Slavery and Freedom”, which aims to overcome the binary opposition of “slavery versus freedom”. We approach the phenomenon of slavery and other types of strong asymmetrical dependency from methodologically and theoretically distinct perspectives.

From the seventeenth to nineteenth centuries, plantations in the Caribbean, South America, and the southern United States played a central role in shaping the Atlantic economy, and served as a model for extractive systems across the modern global countryside. Although the connections between the collapse of slave-based Caribbean regimes and modern commodity frontiers are well-known, this workshop aims to reevaluate the origins, structures, and broader implications of plantations beyond the Atlantic world. The workshop will feature panel discussions in which early-career scholars will be paired with established researchers who will serve as moderators to foster productive, in-depth dialogue.
