hosts the Cluster of Excellence “Beyond Slavery and Freedom”, which aims to overcome the binary opposition of “slavery versus freedom”. We approach the phenomenon of slavery and other types of strong asymmetrical dependency from methodologically and theoretically distinct perspectives.

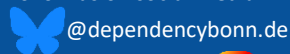
For millennia, humans and animals have co-shaped societies through profound interdependencies, yet the asymmetrical power dynamics of these relationships – and their ripple effects on human social hierarchies – remained underexplored until recently. In the face of the Anthropocene’s planetary crises, integrating ecological dynamics into studies of colonization, slavery, and dependency has become urgent. The interdisciplinary workshop "Entangled Lives: Exploring the (Inter)Dependency Between People and Animals in the Americas" confronts this imperative, dissecting the ecological and cultural dimensions of human-animal relationships across Indigenous communities in the Americas, from the Caribbean to the Paraná Delta.

By probing practices of familiarization, embodied knowledge, and mutual dependency, the workshop interrogates how Indigenous relationships with animals – from livestock to wild species – shaped and were shaped by historical processes of subjugation. Through archaeology, anthropology, and history, experts will reevaluate animals’ roles in systems of power, spotlighting how ecological conviviality coexisted with power imbalances. This gathering seeks to map uncharted territories in human-animal studies, bridging past and present to illuminate pathways for just interspecies futures.
