This conference explores the understudied practice of gifting humans across various cultures. Historians and anthropologists will delve into the motivations of givers, recipients (both divine and human), and the impact on the "gifts" themselves. Analysing aspects like origin, age, gender, and status of these individuals (war captives, slaves, ex voto offerings), the conference will examine how this practice transformed their lives and social standing. Did these human "gifts" gain or lose freedom under their new masters?
